3-generation family tree (Auckland Regional Health Pathways)

- 1. See an <u>example of a family tree</u> (below) which general practitioners could sketch and include with the referral. The aim of this sketch is to try and make it easier and quicker for general practitioners to collect a family history.
- 2. Start with the patient in the centre of the page and collect information about the rest of the family.
- A 3-generation family history sketch includes first degree relatives (children, siblings, parents), and second-degree relatives (aunts, uncles, grandparents) on both sides of the family.
- 4. Ask about:
 - the age at diagnosis of any medical conditions.
 - miscarriages, stillbirths, infertility, or birth defects.
 - other conditions as well as the presenting condition.
 - learning difficulties, mental illness, congenital anomalies.
